Activity Report

The Things They Left Behind and Emerging Artist Exhibit

Both the Emerging Artists Exhibit and "The Things They Left Behind: Grief | Discovery | And Remembrance closed on Sunday, June 26.



"The Things They Left Behind was an outgrowth of our recognition of the many losses we have felt as a community, from Covid. It featured the work of Suzanne Ruley, a beloved artist and arts leader who lost her life to Covid, and we invited community members who had lost a loved one from or during this time of Covid to bring in items connected to that loved one, that they wanted to share.

The Emerging Artist Exhibit was a presentation of work by the 10 artists who made up the Creative Pinellas Emerging Artist cohort of grantees for 2022. As part of the grant (they also received funding and a mentor) the artists were asked to produce new work for the Emerging Artist show.



As it has done every year, the Emerging Artist Exhibit featuring Adam and Kate Bush, Dorian Angelo, Jon Ditty, Alex Kaufman, Teresa Mandala, Rachel Ratcliff, Heather Rippert, Ashley Rivers, Ketsy Ruiz and Margherita Tibaldo, was a major arts event for Pinellas

County – with several visitors to the show mentioning that they have added the exhibit to their calendars.

Additionally, a number of events and activities happened at the gallery in June, related to both shows.


Installation of Additional Objects in *The Things They Left Behind* exhibition.

Visitors responded to what was essentially an invitation, and they provided us additional pieces that were installed during the first week in June. Some examples were a painting, a program from Carnegie Hall, and pottery. All contributors were very grateful that they were able to honor the people they lost by participating in the exhibition.

Online Grief Program


Interim Gallery Director Beth Gelman spoke with Kathleen Quance, Senior Counselor of Empath Health’s Community Counseling program, in an online program that dealt with individual grief and how to support those who are in the midst of the grief process. The conversation was informed by questions submitted previously through email, and by conversations in the gallery with those who submitted objects for *The Things They Left Behind* and with visitors who were moved by the exhibition. The two moved from discussing the fallacy that there was a “normal” way to grieve and how different the individual grief response can be, to the impact these past few years of isolation have had on the grief process, a general sense of heightened anxiety and worries about an uncertain world, and ended with resources and coping strategies.



Emerging Artist Talks and Guided Meditation

Five 2022 Emerging Artists: Margherita Tibaldo, “Sketzi” (Ketsy Ruiz), Heather Rippert, Theresa Mandala, and Ashley Rivers – the Nature of Fire, shared their personal artistic practice and technique as well as the concept and stories of the works of art on display. Between 12 and 25 people were in attendance for each talk.

Fredrick Woods offered guided meditation in *The Things They Left Behind* meditation room. 15 people participated in the relaxing and uplifting session.

On June 26, the Gallery offered a number of activities including an art project, guided meditation, an artist talk, and a special commemoration held in partnership with Empath Health to remember those who had been lost during the past few years. The afternoon ended with a champagne toast to the Emerging Artists.

In June, close to 1020 visitors attended the Gallery exhibitions and special events and the Gallery had \$4700 in sales. An additional piece of artwork is in the works to be purchased by the City of Dunedin.

Summer Camp Grants

Summer Camp Grants have all been distributed and campers are going to camp. An updated number shows 250 campers approved and attending – with some unexpected attrition in the final weeks.

We did provide \$59,652 in grant funds, with the following organizations participating.

- American Stage: 23 campers, \$5,175 in funds
- Beach Arts Center: 50 campers, \$11,250 in funds
- City of Largo Arts Camps: 15 campers \$4,136 in funds
- Dali Museum: 1 camper, \$225 in funds
- Dunedin Fine Art Center: 24 campers, \$5,090 in funds
- High Point Family Center creative writing camp: 30 campers, \$2,250 in funds
- Keep St. Pete Lit: 1 camper, \$150 in funds
- Morean Art Center: 56 campers, \$15,080 in funds
- Morean Center for Clay: 17 campers, \$5,250 in funds
- Museum of Fine Arts: 8 campers, \$2,000 in funds
- Pruitt Arts Education: 4 campers, \$1,196 in funds
- Ruth Eckerd: 8 campers, \$2,225 in funds
- SHAMc: 2 campers, \$400 in funds
- St. Pete Catholic High School: 1 camper, \$500 in funds
- St. Pete City Theatre: 12 campers, \$4,800 in funds
- The James Museum: 3 campers, \$675 in funds

We believe this data is both very telling and very promising. All children who receive grants in this program are either attending Title I schools, receiving a

Also too though, we can support outliers who have high value arts programs, and we can work with organizations like community centers to create arts camps and provide the community that they already serve with high quality arts experiences, based on our support.




Exhibit honors loved ones lost to COVID-19
